After spending parts of three school years bringing social and emotional learning and support to our youth via the arts from computers and behind masks, Rehearsal for Life programs were once again fully live and in-person this past year and the young people we serve absolutely thrived.

Urban Improv marked 30 years of programming by expanding to new communities while offering Residencies and Assemblies addressing important topics like "cyberbullying" and "microaggressions," and also hosting visits by Mayor Michelle Wu and Boston Public Schools Superintendent Mary Skipper. And Youth Unscripted's amazingly talented teens performed original pieces at the Youth Unscripted showcase in March. Not to be outdone, Freelance Players continued to offer outstanding multiarts programming in a supportive, community setting across five Troupes - all while offering tuition assistance made possible by the generosity of the Rehearsal for Life community that shares our belief that no child should ever be turned away from the arts because they don't have the financial means.

As we embark on the 2023-24 program year, there is a palpable buzz across the Rehearsal for Life community. This year's theme is best described as "the sky is the limit" as Rehearsal for Life's talented staff and dedicated board of directors look to the future with an eye on growth and adapting our programs to reach as many young people as possible. Exciting work is already underway to launch Rehearsal for Life summer programming while also expanding to support younger audiences in 2024.

Our Programs

Our dynamic creative youth development programs embody the following Social-Emotional Learning (SEL) Key Measures: Creative Self-Expression, Empathy, Conflict Resolution, Relationship Building/Community, Diversity & Inclusion.



URBAN IMPROV

9 week residencies at 7 BPS partner schools (BTU School, Conley, Hale, Haley, Murphy, Driscoll, Mission Grammar), 61 classrooms—approximately 1,400 students, grades 4-8.

Urban Improv Teaching Artists create realistic scenes about topics such as bullying, peer pressure, racism, and healthy relationships. At a pivotal moment, the facilitator calls "FREEZE!" and students are invited to jump into the scene. Using their minds, bodies and creativity, they work to resolve the conflict while experiencing the outcomes of their creative choices first-hand, in real time, followed by dialogue and discussion with their peers and Rehearsal for Life Teaching Artists.



YOUTH UNSCRIPTED

Our after-school program for Boston teens supports student self-efficacy through their creative exploration of themselves, their communities, and social justice.

During the 2022-23 school year, 19 high school students from across Greater Boston developed, rehearsed, and performed, "Throwbacks, the 2023 Chronicles," an evening of original visual art, music and dance. The students gathered each week to write original songs and scenes that culminated in a performance that brought them into the future for their high school reunion. Along the way, they learned new ways to use their voices to affect change in themselves, their communities, and our world.



FREELANCE PLAYERS

Our after-school musical theater program fosters imagination, self-expression, empathy, and above all, community. Freelance students rehearse and perform original musicals (some of which are written by the performers themselves) in venues across Greater Boston.


ASSEMBLIES




During the 2022-23 school year, we served teachers, families, adults and students throughout Greater Boston with curriculum on Microaggressions, Cyberbullying & Technology, and Bullying & Bystander Issues. Additionally, we expanded our reach to work with adults at corporations and community groups, helping them build community and trust and foster healthy communication through improv and theater games.




I feel nervous when I have to talk in front of a lot of people because of my stutter, but doing this gives you more confidence and it feels easier.




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A creative tour de force came together at one of Boston's newest venues, Roadrunner, on April 27th as more than 400 friends of Rehearsal for Life-including educators, luminaries, chefs, and crew-returned to the stage for the first time since 2019 to put on the highwire act that is Banned in Boston. A star-studded cast of local luminaries, including Massachusetts Governor Maura Healey, joined the cast and lent their talents to raise \$425,336 in support of our creative youth development programs and in celebration of 30 years of Urban Improv. Our continued gratitude goes to Faith Soloway for telling a story with heart and humor and for crafting the music, script and lyrics, as well as Funderdome Director, Ian Brownell, who went above and beyond in order to make Banned in Boston a smash success!




